Extract A Competition in the UK grocery market

The UK grocery market is highly competitive. Up to 70% of the goods sold by these businesses are identical or very similar. They compete using a range of price and non-price strategies. Examples of non-price strategies include:

- Waitrose offers high-quality customer service 5
- In 2024 Asda announced that it was opening 25 new stores
- Tesco has partnered with The Entertainer, a toy shop, to start selling toys in over 2000 of its stores
- All of the grocery stores compete with branding and advertising.

Extract B Increase in wage rates

Since 2024 the National Living Wage (NLW) has included workers aged 21 and over. Previously, the NLW applied only to those aged 23 and over. In 2025 the NLW was increased from £11.44 to £12.21 per hour.

In response, several stores increased wage rates. For example, Tesco increased the hourly wage rate for its workers from £12.02 to £12.64. 5

In order to retain their workers, grocery stores have introduced several measures to reduce their costs. For example, some stores have reduced opening hours and closed down their fresh food counters.

Extract C Problems facing UK farmers

A 2024 survey reported that 40% of British strawberry and raspberry farmers could shut down by 2026. This would be a result of rising costs and the low prices paid for their products by UK grocery stores. Many of these farmers reported no profits, with 53% indicating they were only just covering their costs. 5

Costs of production have been increasing significantly. However, this has not been reflected in the prices paid to farmers by the grocery stores. Between 2021 and 2024 the price of a packet of strawberries in the stores increased by an average of 27 pence but the price paid to farmers only increased by an average of 3.5 pence. This reflects the monopsony power of the grocery stores. The four largest grocery stores stated that they were working hard to limit price increases for consumers, since many people are struggling to afford essential food items. 10
